The MMF strives to create an open and cooperative environment where partnerships can thrive. The MMF MEDOCare Pharmacy is an example of how beneficial partnerships can work. When we spend our hard-earned dollars on products and services provided by the businesses owned by our community, then our dollars produce a big benefit for our community. Already your purchases at MEDOCare are making a difference for our Elders. With the profits from MEDOCare Pharmacy, the MMF has been able to create the MMF Elder Vision Care Initiative. This service is helping our Elders, who have limited income, through the process of receiving an eye exam, getting a prescription and ordering their prescription eyeglasses. This has happened because you are supporting MEDOCare Pharmacy by getting your prescriptions here. I encourage you to keep doing this. Remember, MEDOCare Pharmacy is able to deliver your prescriptions to your home anywhere in Manitoba or Canada!

But on the other hand, if our money is spent outside our community-owned business, in foreign or non-aboriginal owned businesses, then it is the outsider owners or shareholders who get most of the benefits. It is clear then, as simple as 1-2-3, that to help our community we must spend in our community owned businesses.

Another example of good partnerships is the housing construction on Hallet Street in Winnipeg. Over 70% of the contractors involved are Metis and other First Nation businesses. In Brandon, the housing development will have over 80% Metis and First Nation contractors providing the construction of new housing for Metis people. N4 Construction is another good example as well. This Metis construction

company has partnered with Aboriginal-owned companies with Metis and First Nation employees to help meet the Manitoba Hydro Bipole III development needs. These for-benefit business partnerships are a smart approach to ensuring our community needs are met. They help build a strong foundation for future benefits for all our children.

Other minority groups in Canada have realized the importance of coming together with one voice and purpose. They have formed mutually beneficial partnerships with other groups and their people have supported those ventures. This openness to partnership and community support have led to great success. I call on all Metis citizens, friends and businesses to support each other. Support good partnerships. Invest in and buy from Metis businesses and their partners. Help them survive and succeed. Their success will strengthen us as a community. It will help bring prosperity to our families and a sense of pride at what we can accomplish together.
