Consultations are focused and meant to hear my voice, whereas the AGA is the place to create the change on our already shared, researched, and heard voices. On the Saturday of this weekend, I spent the time being educated on the Red River Métis culture and the difference the MMF will make for Métis people. On Saturday, I really got to appreciate the authority and change the MMF provides. It was empowering to see Citizens freely take the mic to voice their thoughts, challenge ideas, and ask questions. This open exchange allowed everyone to be heard and responded to, embodying the strength of our community's democratic values. However, I believe that if you're willing to present an idea or resolution, you should be prepared to engage with differing perspectives. Respecting one another's opinions, even in disagreement, is crucial. As a Nation, fostering unity rather than division serves our collective growth and resilience. While Youth turnout may not be as strong as we'd like, it's understandable given the demands of jobs, extracurriculars, and varying interest levels in politics. "The IWS Youth Department has always made me feel supported and heard. When I first joined the MMF and the IWS, I was apprehensive because I thought I looked "too white." But it didn't take long before the other MMF and IWS members made me feel at home. When it comes to addressing feedback from participants, the IWS staff are incredible. After attending the Wellness Weekend back in April, we were instructed to provide feedback to inform future gatherings of IWS members. When the AGA came around, it was clear that the IWS staff heard our concerns and acted on them accordingly. I know that as members of IWS, we felt that our voices

were heard. The Youth of the IWS are valued on a similar level to Elders. Our insight is valued, and we are made to feel that our opinions matter. In many traditional non-Métis settings, youth are told to be silent and to "not speak unless spoken to." But not in the IWS. The voices of the youth are empowered by those older than us, and we feel that we can speak our minds without fear of backlash. It is a beautiful thing to have a community that loves and supports its youth in this way. I am proud to be an IWS member and I am proud to be a Red River Métis woman."

REMEMBERING THOSE WHO HAVE SERVED: A CELEBRATION OF RED RIVER MÉTIS VETERANS



From the days of the great bison hunt to today, the Red River Métis have not only been patriots, we've also been champions of democracy. We have advocated for our rightful place in this country and have made our presence known through the Victory of Frog Plain in 1816, the Battle of Batoche in 1885, our active involvement in World War I in 1914 and World War II in 1939, and the 1869 Red River Resistance leading to the creation of Manitoba in 1870. Thousands of Red River Métis men and women have taken up arms in defense of democracy both in our Homeland and across the globe.

We honour all war Veterans whether they fight for our Nation on our home soil or went elsewhere to fight for principles the Red River Métis still hold dear today: democracy, community, and minority rights. Today, you will often see Red River Métis Citizens wearing beautiful handmade beaded poppies to honour the memory and legacies of our Veterans.

Every year on November 8, the Red River Métis Veterans Department (RRMVD) hosts an Indigenous Veterans Day ceremony to celebrate the remarkable bravery and sacrifice of our Red River Métis Veterans. Citizens can attend the ceremony in-person or online via livestream.

Our Veterans and their families deserve to be recognized for their service to our country year-round, which is why the MMF is committed to educating our Citizens and the Canadian public about the contributions our Veterans made to defend our country. Veterans are our heroes today, tomorrow, and forever.

RED RIVER MÉTIS YOUTH AWARDED PRESTIGIOUS CORONATION MEDAL



Red River Métis Youth Kyra De La Ronde received the King Charles III's Coronation Medal, given to Canadians who have made significant contributions to Canada or a particular province, territory, region or community.

Red River Métis Youth Kyra De La Ronde has added another prestigious award to her impressive collection.

The Citizen received the King Charles III's Coronation Medal, given to Canadians who have made significant contributions to Canada or a particular province, territory, region or community.

De La Ronde, who currently works for the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF) as a Beyond Borders Coordinator, was one of 100 Canadians to receive the award in Quebec from Governor General of Canada during a ceremony on September 20, 2024, at the Citadelle of Québec. She said it was very shocking at first.

"I couldn't quite wrap my mind around it. To be recognized at this high level by Mary Simon, the Governor General of Canada. She's the first Indigenous person, let alone an Inuit woman, to be in this role for Canada. So, it's a huge honour to receive (the award) from her and be recognized as a young Red River Métis woman," she said. "I was the only Manitoban that received it from her 100 (nominations), so there was a little bit of added pride being able to bring it back here to Manitoba."

The Coronation Medal marks the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, which took place on May 6, 2023.

There were five categories of award winners: diversity and inclusion, reconciliation, environment and climate change, youth, and education. De La Ronde received the award in the reconciliation category for her work with Red River Métis Youth.

"I feel that she (Mary Simon) put a lot of thought into who she wanted to receive this from herself. There were very notable individuals there. I felt like a small fish in a big pond, but it was truly amazing," she said. "I got to bring my grandmother with me. So, we got to go and do some tourist activities the evening before the event."



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Although the Red River Metis Youth was one of 100 people to be hand-selected by the Governor General, 30,000 medals will be distributed to Canadians throughout 2024. De La Ronde has been a part of the MMF's Youth movement since she was 18 and has put herself in a place where she started educating herself, spending time in the community, and spending time with Elders.

"I had the most energy and personal satisfaction (working) with the Youth, and the community," she said. "I'm very grateful to be able to have represented Youth at a community level with the Interlake Youth Advisory Committee, on a provincial level, and then further (on a) national and international level with the youth position I previously held."

Throughout her tenure on Youth councils, the award recipient has concluded that there is some amazing Red River Métis talent out there.

"We have doctors, lawyers, and people who are becoming marine biologists. We have a whole market of employable young people. I think sometimes what happens is we still see them as young people. We don't give them the credit they're owed, in terms of the work they've put in and the time they've spent in the community," she said.



The Red River Métis Youth has achieved many accolades since joining the MMF. She has served as the Infinity Women Representative for the MMF Regional Youth Advisory Committee within the Interlake Region, as well as Chairperson of the MMF Provincial Youth Advisory Committee. De La Ronde was also part of the delegation that travelled to Rome to meet Pope Francis and was the first Red River Métis Valedictorian from Red River College Polytechnic.

De La Ronde is proud to be recognized for this award and said this medal was more than a personal accomplishment.

"It was for my family; it was for my Nation. It was for all the Youth I previously represented and just really giving this space to recognize that young people can do great things," said the award winner.

DON'T EVEN MISS OUT ON THIS RED RIVER MÉTIS PERFORMER'S NEW SHOW



If Victoria Gwendoline were to leave her mark on this world, it would be through her art.

The multi-faceted creator explores her artistic abilities through various mediums such as acting, singing, metalsmithing, and more.

"That's all I have to offer this world, and that's all I want to do," she said as she discussed her latest projects.

The Red River Métis artist co-stars in *Don't Even*, a comedy series following Indigenous best friends in late '90s Winnipeg as they grapple with their uncertain futures after finishing high school.

"It's just about that time in your life and it's filled with so much pressure and everybody seems like they have it figured out, but nobody actually does. Or they're pressured by their parents or they're just on their own. It's just such an intense time to be a young adult," said Gwendoline.

The coming-of-age story first launched on the streaming service Crave this summer, and will be available on APTN sometime before 2025.

Being on the set of shows like *Don't Even* has allowed the artist to connect with other Indigenous people in the industry, which can be very motivating.

"Anytime I get the opportunity to be in the Indigenous community, it helps me with (reconnecting) and it's healing," she said. "I met so many other Indigenous musicians and actors and we all lift each other up. We're all trying to give each

other more opportunities and it's just nice to be in that space."

She also loves how the city of Winnipeg can be seen as a main character in her new show.

"We never have shows about this place and Winnipeg plays a character. Winnipeg is so vibrant, wacky, strange, and colourful and I love (it)," said Gwendoline.

Being from Winnipeg herself, she has a profound sense of attachment to the Red River Métis Homeland. "Ultimately, it makes me feel so connected to this place on an emotional and spiritual level. I think about that all the time, I'm Red River Métis..." she said. "That is another reason I feel so connected to this show."



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The artist spoke about her experiences growing up Red River Métis and what inspired her to explore her cultural identity.

"Similar to a lot of people in Manitoba's experiences, (my) family struggled with losing culture over the years, and it was confusing for me growing up knowing I was Métis but not knowing anything about the culture, and just having that information but feeling this disconnect," she said.

As her career grows, Gwendoline does her best to prioritize all her interests beyond acting.

"I feel like my soul came here to sing, but I also have a lot of other art forms that I appreciate, love, and make time for," she said. "Natural art, crystals, rocks, bones, fossils, that sort of thing, and Metalsmithing, (it) kind of intertwines. My love of art goes into not just my singing, but my metalsmithing, my clay, my acting as well."

For anyone hoping to pursue a career in the arts, Gwendoline says you have to get used to hearing "no" a lot.

"The amount of auditions I've had to do to just get to this point, it's been challenging, but you just have to do the scary thing," she said. "You have to keep going. Keep auditioning. Don't take 'no' personally and just believe in yourself."

She used to think being an actor was a faraway dream, but now, she is living proof that if you work hard enough and stay determined, you can achieve whatever you want.

"You have to be vulnerable. You can't be afraid of what people say and at the end of the day you have to make your art for you and that's scary but it's what makes an artist," said Gwendoline.
